

DOWN MEMORY LANE

On a Fairchild Packet to Ladakh and back

A career in defence is action-packed. Flying for the Indian Air Force, as our member, Wng Cmdr A. C. Roychowdhury, did, life could be quite a thriller and the memories lifelong. Posted in Ladakh for six months in the early sixties, our member has many fascinating stories to share.

Our member, Wng Cmdr A. C. Roychowdhury, then serving in the Indian Air Force (IAF), was posted in Pathankot with his family, when he received orders to move to Ladakh for a six-month tenure. He would be flying the Fairchild Packet from Pathankot to Ladakh.

The Fairchild Packet was designed to carry a limited number of passengers. There was also the Antonov An-12, a four-engined turboprop transport aircraft designed in the Soviet Union.

The memories of those flights still give him goosebumps. Once, flying as a passenger from Pathankot to Ladakh,

he had experienced how difficult it was for the pilot to manoeuvre the aircraft between the mountains. Any error would mean the wings crashing into the ranges and loss of lives. Sometimes the already precarious situation was made worse by the thick clouds covering the entire stretch. The moment the pilot thought that he had survived one challenge, another lot of deep clouds would envelope everything.

The memories of flying with one's heart in one's mouth have not been dimmed over time. The pilots would heave a sigh of relief only when the aircraft finally landed in Ladakh. Even the landing was fraught with dangers because there was hardly a runway. It was just a small asphalted stretch. There was zero margin for error even while landing; the danger of the aircraft crashing into the surrounding mountains was very real.


For the six months that he was stationed at Ladakh, he was in a wooden house and it was bitterly cold outside. The floor was made of wood too and the orderlies lit charcoal and wood fires inside the rooms to keep them heated. Green vegetables were a dream there and they depended on the dried tinned food, cooked by the chef. The office was a walking distance from the house. Some personnel developed breathing difficulties in the high altitude and had to stay indoors till they got acclimatised. Indeed,

breathlessness was part of the territory.

Fortunately, our member had no such problems and he could stay outdoors, playing volleyball in the evenings. That was enormously enjoyable after a strenuous day's work.

The only other entertainment was watching movies. Indeed, as Wng Cmdr Roychowdhury jokingly said, movies were the only occasion when they saw normal people, because there was no one around. There was no other source of livelihood. The only living beings, other than the defence personnel, were the yaks that came within sight at times. His most cherished memory was watching the movie "Saheb Bibi Ghulam" in the army movie hall. "I have watched several movies but watching this one at that high altitude and severe cold is still fresh in my mind". **SE**

Before they started the journey though, the captain had some interesting tidings: "I have arranged for a floating zoo for your kids!"

Ms Silliman thought that he was joking with her but she soon realised that the ship only had three cabins: one for the captain and two for guests. When she went to the deck, an amazing sight awaited her. Hanging around on the deck were her co-passengers: some 11 elephant cubs, about four huge cages of birds of different species and few monkeys!

The children were absolutely excited to meet their co-passengers. Imagine! a ship full of animals for company; it was almost like Noah's Arc. They were being transported from Kolkata to a zoo in the U.K.

The kids got into the act of being friendly co-passengers. They spent the days on the deck, bathing them and playing with them, save for the time

The ship harboured in Chennai and Cochin en route to pick up food for all its passengers before travelling through the Suez Canal.

Her son, who was very fond of bananas and milk, managed to get one or two everyday from the bunch of bananas kept for the elephant cubs. The captain told him in jest: "Those bananas are for the elephants and if you eat them, I will offer you to the cubs as a meal."

After the ship crossed the Suez Canal and entered Sudan, there were new passengers on board.

A herd of cows joined the floating zoo, which was a matter of special delight for her son,

who thought that he could have any amount of milk that he wished to.

The ship sailed through Alexandria and reached the U.K. after five weeks but there was so much happening on board that it seemed like five days! Like all good things that come to an end, the ship reached the U.K and the camaraderie with the animal kingdom was over.

The trip was fun, of course, but an excellent lesson for the children.

Ms Silliman reminisced that it was like a school away from school with the children learning so much about the denizens of the animal kingdom.
